The AG Teachers and Alumni purchase these animals from breeders and they are divvied out to students based on a lottery draw system.

Students draw numbers and choose their animal in that order.

All SBFFA purchased market animals are shown at the Spring Branch FFA Show and Sale in February.

• All Market animals are raised and sold with the intent of being processed for food production. All animals will be taken to a processing plant and then picked up by the buyer (lambs/goats/pigs/steers) or delivered to the buyer (poultry/rabbits) by the exhibitor.

Financial and Transportation Help

If your only reason for saying no is because of financial reasons, please speak with an AST one on one about your options, especially if you are a 1st time animal raiser.

If transportation to the barn after school is a reason for saying no, please see the after school bus schedule below:

- Bus picks up at home campus @ dismissal

Pig/Lamb/Goat Information

4 Month Project

Both the animal and the pen it lives in require daily care

Must be fed twice a day

- Consistency! Feeding at the same time each day is most beneficial.
- Monitor feed intake

Exercise and show preparations

- Walking/training everyday
- Washing and grooming
- Lambs/goats need more exercise closer to show

Clean and maintain pen daily

- Keep bedding clean of poop and wet spots
- Lambs/goats live on sand
- Pigs live on wood shavings



Optional Supplements:

- Supplements are an optional addition to any feed ration.
- They can be very helpful but can hurt if you don't know what you are feeding or why.
- Do the research and evaluate what your animal needs prior to purchasing.
- Supplements can cancel each other out if feeding too many together.
- There are supplements for almost anything but aren't a magic fix and can get costly.

Working with your animal

Start Slow in getting animal used to your presence by sitting in pen while eating.

Get your animal used to your touch all over its body with hand or brush

Start walking around with your animal on the rope halter. (More than likely they will fight and throw tantrums. Its normal, just stay persistent)

Work up to walking with neck chain with goats and without anything for lambs.

Build your animals stamina in standing still. Put on the head racks and make them stand. Always supervise!

Work up to exercising. Start with gaining weight and then closer to show we will start running to turn fat into muscle.

Pen Set Up



Required to keep a thick layer of sand at all times. Included in cost and provided.

Will need to set pens up prior to animals arriving.

Pens required to be kept clean of poop build up and wet spots.



4ft x 11ft



1st Week

Start animal off slow on feed and hay

Wash with soap (preferably a fungicide shampoo) within the first 2 days.

Watch for runny mucus filled nose, running a temperature, or not eating/drinking

Sit with animal in the first feedings letting them get used to you.

Slowly introduce them to walking on the halter.



Feeding Information

Required twice a day

CONSISTENCY!

 Feeding the same feed and at the same time everyday is very helpful.

Monitor Feed intake

Pick up uneaten feed after 20 minutes

Everyone will need to start their pig on **the same feed** to allow for a transition off of what
the breeders is feeding

Transitioning Feed:

Day 1: Feed 1 100%

Day 2: AM Feed 1 80%, Feed 2 (New Feed) 20%:

PM Feed 1 50% Feed 2 50%

Day 3: AM Feed 1 50% Feed 2 50%; PM Feed 1 20% Feed 2 80%,

Day 4: Feed 2 100%

Some pigs will need to transition a bit slower



Working with your animal

- Start Slow in getting animal used to your presence by sitting in pen while eating.
- Get your animal used to your touch all over its body with hand or brush
- Start walking up and down the alleyway keeping your pig at a walk(More than likely they
 will run or not walk. Its normal, just stay persistent)
 - If they run a quick tap between the ears should slow them down
- You should be able to walk down and back under full control before you walk outside in the yard or around the farm.
- Build your animals stamina. Walk a little more every day, be persistent and dont wait to long your pig will get barn sour
- Start out feeding after you walk, a reward. This isnt always a foolproof plan, but start with this.

Pen Set Up


Pine Shavings - 2 - 3 bags will cover your pen.

You will be removing shavings daily so you will want at least 1 more bag to replace as you take some out

You need a carabiner clip locking your gate at all times!

Stalls are 4ft 5in wide by 9ft 8in









1st Week

Start animal off slow - they may not finish all of their feed at first start with 1 to 1.5 lbs

Wash with soap within the first 3 days.

Watch for runny mucus filled nose, running a temperature, or not eating/drinking, they will most likely have a little of this or diarrhea, that's ok! Just let me know

Sit with animal in the first few feedings letting them get used to you. Don't try walking other than to the wash rack that 1st few days.

1st Day Set Up



Brooder Ring made of any available material to keep the chicks centered in the pen about 3-4 feet in diameter.

Keep chicks like this until they are about 7 days old.

Put a cloth sheet or similar material down, on top of the shaving before creating this ring.

Heat lamps should be 18 - 24 inches from shavings so that the pen area does not drop below 90 degrees - with a goal temp of 95 degrees

You will need to put up tarps around the edge of your stall if you are at the barn.





Setting Up Your Lights

All Lights will need to be suspended with a chain, rope, or clamp. NOT BY THE CORD.

As the chickens get older you with raise the heat lamps



Feed Options



I recommend Producers or Purina, but there are a lot of other options.

Do the research, find buying locations and make the choice best for you.

Everyone will need to start on a crumbled turkey starter (26% Protein)

Places to buy feed: Needville Feed, Tri-County Producer Coop, Katy Feed & Tack







Other Information

You will have to Cull - or remove the number of birds in your pen

- At 10 days if you buy 50
- At 21 days if you buy 25 or 50
- Final selection at 2-4 days before show

Selection is based on width and length of the birds breast only not weight.



Pen Set Up

Pine Shavings - 3 -5 bags will cover your pen (4 inches thick)

• This should last you a few weeks

You will be removing shavings daily so you will want at least 1 more bag to replace as you take some out

Stalls are about 8 ft by 8 ft 8 in



 - Paperwork drop off (animal ordering night)
 - September 18th from 3:30 8:00 PM

Requirements With Raising a Livestock Project

- **Bi -monthly livestock checks** Tuesdays 3-6PM
 - With virtual checks weekly
- Get **all the necessary points** in order to receive check 3 of each color (green, yellow & blue) *1 of each color by end of fall semester
- Sell Ads
 - Deadline November 14th
- Attend the SBFFA Progress show (or other progress show) before the end of the semester (except rabbits/poultry)
 - SBFFA Progress Show November 28th
- **Recite the FFA Creed** in order to get FFA Jacket (have to show in Official Dress)
 - Must say the Creed & pay for the Jacket by November 30th
- Attend mandatory work days in September and January
 - September 23rd & January 27th (includes Mandatory Meeting)
